COMMISSIONERS APPOINT NEW POLICE CHIEF



At a public meeting on Thursday evening March 28, 2013, the Caln Township Board of Commissioners approved the appointment of Joseph G. Elias of Lititz, Pennsylvania as the Township's new Chief of Police.

Joseph Elias was a Major in the Pennsylvania State Police and served as the Executive Director of the Municipal Police Officers' Education and Training Commission (MPOPETC) which is responsible for training standards, curriculum development and certification of all municipal police officers throughout the state.

Chief Elias has served with the state police for 28 years including spending his first six years of service as an officer with Troop J Avondale patrolling Chester County. Chief Elias is a graduate of Penn State University and the FBI National Academy. He resides in Litiz with his wife and two children.

The Caln Police Department has 18 full time officers serving a community of 14,000 and the Thorndale Business District. Lt. Jeffery Nash has done an excellent job serving as the acting Chief of Police for the last 6 months. Caln Police is a full service operation with investigative, traffic, community policing and patrol responsibilities.

The Township swore in Chief Elias publicly at the April 25, 2013 Board of Commissioners meeting. He began work in mid-April.

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

YOU CAN HELP DETECT STREAM POLLUTION

Caln Township, as well as many other communities in the Southeastern Pennsylvania region, recently was required to obtain a permit from the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection for its storm drainage system. This permit required Caln Township to locate and map all storm water piping and drainage ditch systems owned and maintained by the Township. The permit also requires the Township to inspect these drainage systems periodically to detect any "illicit discharges" from the systems.

What in the world is an illicit discharge? Simply stated, an illicit discharge is something that is exiting a storm drainage pipe or drainage ditch that is not storm water and potentially could pollute our streams. Examples of illicit discharges that would be typical for a community like ours are septic system overflows, sanitary wastewater, chlorinated pool water, paints, oil or other vehicle fluids, etc.

While the Township inspects its drainage system thoroughly, our Highways Department personnel can not be everywhere all the time. If you happen to see something exiting a storm pipe or ditch that looks, smells or feels like something other than storm water, please contact the Township's Engineering Department so we can track it to its source and keep our streams as clean and pure as possible. To report an illicit discharge, call the Engineering Department or send an email to engineer@calntownship.org.





Caln Township Board of Commissioners Approve a LERTA District in Thorndale

At a public meeting on April 11, 2013, the Caln Township Board of Commissioners approved an ordinance adopting a LERTA District within the Thorndale Business District. The Coatesville School District has also expressed its support of the LERTA program.

LERTA stands for the Local Economic Revitalization Act, a state law adopted over 30 years ago to encourage economic development statewide. LERTA is an important tool for the future development of business in Thorndale. The Thorndale Business District has been changing over the past decade. Numerous properties are vacant or in substandard structural condition. There have been limited improvements but not enough to truly counteract recent downward trends. LERTA will provide an important financial incentive for new construction and improvements to existing properties. A short term partial tax incentive will provide long term tax and employment increases.

Only the tax assessment on new construction/reconstruction is affected. The property will continue to pay at least the same amount of taxes on the parcel that was paid prior to the LERTA. Properties will have ten years from the start of the program to participate. Beyond 10 years the taxing bodies must extend the program. The township and school board approval documents have been sent to the Chester County Commissioners for their approval. Once approved by the County, the LERTA District program will be available for the development and improvement of commercial and business properties within the designated area. Receiving a Recording when calling 9-1-1 = Do Not Hang Up

Occasionally, usually during severe storms with wide-spread power outages, more 9-1-1 calls are made than can be answered. During these times, after a few rings the caller will receive a recorded message letting the caller know that they have dialed 9-1-1 and all telecommunicators are busy. The recording will instruct the caller to stay on the line, except if they are calling to report a power outage. If this is the case, the caller will be instructed to call their electric provider.

EVEN DURING THESE BUSY TIMES, CALLERS SHOULD NOT HANG UP ONCE THEY HAVE DIALED 9-1-1. EVEN WITH A HANG UP, WE STILL RECEIVE YOUR PHONE INFORMATION, AND HAVE TO CALL BACK AND VERIFY THAT YOU DO NOT NEED ASSISTANCE; THIS COULD DELAY HELP FOR SOMEONE ELSE WHO NEEDS IT.

If you dial 9-1-1 by error, simply let the call-taker know when they answer the call. The call-taker may ask some questions to verify that the call was dialed in error and that you truly do not need help.

10 TIPS FOR PROTECTING YOUR HOME

More than 1.5 million residential burglaries occur every year in the United States, according to the FBI. Thieves target electronics, jewelry and other valuables, resulting in an average dollar loss of \$2,079.

It's not just about the money for many families, however. Thieves often take sentimental items and other things that can't be replaced. And with identity theft now the fastest growing crime in the United States, burglars are now after your personal information and financial records as well.

There are measures you can take to protect your home and family, many of which are easy and free. Secure your home with these 10 tips:

- I. **Get a home security system.** It should come as no surprise that the number one tool for crime prevention in your home is a home security system. When confronted with a functioning alarm system, burglars commit crimes elsewhere. If you're serious about protecting your home and family, purchasing a home security system should be your first move. It doesn't have to cost a fortune either; some companies will give you the home security system for free, you just have to pay for the monthly monitoring.
- 2. Secure your windows. Broken or cracked windows are an open invitation to thieves. If you have any in your home, replace or repair them as soon as possible. Even broken windows on a second or third level put you at risk, as thieves can and will find a way up there. It's also smart to keep obvious valuables away from windows, so as to not tempt thieves on the prowl.
- **3. Shed some light on the situation.** Keeping your outside entry ways lit provides you with security when you return home late at night and also has a big effect on home security. All exterior lighting is not created equal, however. Motion-sensing lights can be triggered by even the slightest motion, like an animal or tree branch. Opt for heat-sensing lights instead, which only turn on when they detect human body temperature. Also, low wattage lights tend to be better than the high wattage ones, as they don't cast as many dark shadows where thieves can hide.
- **4. Maintain your yard.** Overgrown trees and shrubs are handy hiding places for thieves and branches can be used to climb into windows, so make sure you keep up your yard and trim trees back from the house. You can use landscaping to your advantage as well, like planting thorny bushes around first-story windows to deter thieves. Make sure to also keep gates, garages and storage sheds locked up, as easily-accessible ladders and tools can make it easier for a thief to break in.
- **5. Protect your valuables.** A professional thief knows all the obvious hiding places a freezer, under the mattress or in a cookie jar. Avoid hiding your valuables in these places. If you purchase a new TV or another type of valuable, don't leave empty boxes at the curb for trash pickup, as they're an obvious sign to thieves of what's inside your home.
- **6. Protect your identity.** Thieves these days are after more than just your jewelry and valuables. Personal information and financial records that make it easy for a thief to steal your identity are also a target. Protect this valuable information by securing it in a lock box or safe, and use a shredder to limit the amount of personal information available to thieves. You can also lower your risk of having your identity stolen with identity theft protection services.
- 7. Make your home look "lived in."- Burglars typically steer clear of homes that are occupied. That's why it's important to set lights on timers and leave a radio or TV on when you leave the house. Make sure your timers have a random option that will turn lights on at different times on different days, making it harder for a burglar to detect an obvious pattern.
- **8. Improve your neighborhood.** A good relationship with your neighbors is a strong asset when it comes to home security. You can't always be home, so it can be a great comfort to know that others are looking out for you. In addition to forming relationships with your neighbors, you may want to help form a neighborhood watch program to ensure your block doesn't become a safe haven for thieves.
- **9. Keep a detailed inventory of the valuables in your home.** In case your home is burglarized, having a detailed list of the valuable items in your home will help the police and insurance company more quickly replace and recover your stolen property. If creating a list seems daunting, pick up your camera and take pictures of your valuables. Make sure you store copies of your photos on a DVD or hard drive, and keep these storage devices in a safe place.

10. Pretend to be a burglar.

Lastly, put yourself in the thief's shoes. Walk around your property with a close friend or neighbor and ask yourself, "If I was a burglar, how would I break in?" And don't do it alone — a friend or neighbor may spot things you overlook.

While you can't secure your home 100 percent, there are things you can do to significantly limit your risk. Burglars aren't looking for a challenge! They're interested in a scenario that makes it easy for them to get in and out with valuables and cash. If you make it difficult for someone to break into your home, your house is not likely going to be a thief's first pick.

Cooking Grease - The Number One Cause of Sewer Backups in Homes and Businesses

What problems are caused by grease?

- · Clogged drains or toilets.
- · Sewage backups into your home or business.
- Sewer overflows in neighborhood parks, yards, and streets.
- · Rancid odors.
- Expensive cleanup, repair, and replacement of damaged property.
- · Potential contact with bacteria and viruses that can cause illness.
- · Higher operating and maintenance costs, potentially resulting in higher sewer bills for you.

Don't pour cooking grease down drains.

Why is cooking grease a problem?

If you pour cooking grease down your drains, it may build up, block your pipes, and cause rancid odors, or messy costly sewage backups in your home. It can also clog the Township's sewer lines. When you pour hot grease down your drains, the grease eventually cools, then congeals and coats pipes. When enough grease builds up, it can block your plumbing or the Township's sewer lines.

How can you help protect your plumbing and our environment?


- · Never pour grease down sinks, toilets, or any drains.
- Pour grease into a can for disposal in the trash. You can make your own grease can using any empty metal can (not plastic, which melts) and disposable, heat-resistant oven bags. Just toss the bags in the trash (after grease cools) and reuse the can. [Note: Use caution when pouring hot grease or wait for it to cool slightly. Hot grease can burn skin.]
- After grease cools, scrape grease and food scraps into a can or the trash for disposal.
- Use strainers in sinks to catch food scraps, and empty the strainers into the trash.
- Don't rely on a garbage disposal to get rid of grease—it grinds food into smaller pieces, but doesn't keep grease from going down the drain.
- Wipe cookware and dishes before washing. Commercial additives in detergents only dissolve grease temporarily.
- Inspect and clean your grease traps on a regular basis.

A Message from the Highways Department

TREE TRIMMING ALONG ROAD RIGHT-OF-WAYS

The Township Highways Department will be cutting back overhanging branches, brush and vegetation from the Township roadways as required to maintain clear and passable roadways. Overhanging trees obstruct the roadway when they are weigh down by snow, creating difficult situations for our snow removal vehicles. Please check the road frontage of your property to see if your trees or shrubs may be overhanging the road or obstructing street signs. If your prefer to prune back your own trees or shrubs, please use the following guide lines.

- I. Tree branches and bushes should be clear of the road edge by a minimum of (24") two feet and that clearance should extend to (10') ten feet in height.
- 2. New plantings, i.e trees, shrubs, etc. should not be planted within the road right-of-way! Please contact the Township Zoning Office for these specifications prior to planting to avoid excess work.



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
