



The farm is historical. For many years part of it was owned by President James Buchanan. The old mansion is intact and is used as the residence of a member of the Ingleside Farms Company.


There are several other dwelling houses on the place, which are occupied by the various department superintendents. An immense boarding house accommodates the other help.

**A**T present, three well known farms are being operated under the management of Ingleside Farms Co.:—Ingleside Farm, Woods Lane Farm, and the Stouffer Farm.

The first of these is located at Thorndale, Pa., a station on the main line of the Pennsylvania R. R., midway between Downingtown and Coatesville. This station is right at the farm entrance, which is also passed by an electric road between the two towns mentioned above.

Ingleside Farm contains 548 acres of land, and is the headquarters of this company. On this farm will be found thousands of laying hens which are kept prime for the production of market eggs. Also a flock of 4,000 S. C. White Leghorn breeders. The greater part of the Leghorns are reared here under ideal conditions. For this purpose we have installed two 15,000 egg capacity incubators and a model brooder house of large capacity.

The dairy herd of selected Jerseys is also quartered here.

Woods Lane Farm is located at Leaman Place, fifteen miles east of Lancaster on the Pennsylvania R. R. This farm embraces 180 acres and is stocked with 4,000 S. C. White Leghorn breeders. The rearing equipment here includes a mammoth incubator of 12,000 egg capacity and a corresponding brooder house.

The Stouffer Farm is at White Hill, Cumberland Co., Pa., about three miles from Harrisburg. This place is devoted exclusively to the production of Pekin Ducks for which it has an unrivaled reputation.

The breeding flock numbers 1,500 head, and from 60,000 to 80,000 ducklings are marketed yearly. These invariably “top the market” because of their superior quality.

The hatching is done in 4 mammoth incubators and 75 small incubators with a total capacity of nearly 60,000 eggs, and the ducklings are reared in pipe-heated brooder houses.

This farm remains under the direct personal management of Mr. Chas. A. Stouffer.

Briefly stated, the Ingleside Farms Co. controls 700 acres of rich farming land. Their poultry stock and equipment include 12,000 S. C. White Leghorns, 1,500 Pekin Ducks, incubators with 100,000 egg capacity, mills for feed grinding and mixing, brooder houses and poultry buildings sufficient to house the great flocks and rear the youngsters. This is America’s greatest poultry business.





## Our Method

**Q** White Leghorns are the recognized champion heavy laying hens; they bring the profits

**T**HE methods of poultry management followed at Ingleside Farms are the result of years of practical experience. Our first aim is to keep our birds in the very pink of condition. We want them to be full of vim, vigor, vitality. Weak, sickly, debilitated stock never made a profit for anyone. Ingleside Leghorns inherit that vigor of constitution, that abounding health which good layers and breeders must have. Then we conserve these essential characteristics by proper methods of housing and feeding.

Ingleside Leghorns are raised on free range. After leaving the brooder house they are quartered in colony houses and given unrestricted range over as many acres of orchard, field and woodland as they wish to roam. Here they find abundant green food, insects with numbers, the purest of water in the spring-fed streams. In fact, all conditions are conducive to lusty growth and the up-building of strong constitutions.

As the cockerels approach broiler size they are rigidly culled, and all which fail to meet our exacting requirements are marketed. None but specimens of true Leghorn type with every appearance of possessing that great vigor which we demand, are permitted to mature. This rigid selection is the secret of the excellence of our breeding males.

The pullets are culled too. Every weak, slow-growing, inferior bird is promptly sent to market. We don't want them; we won't sell them to you. Such a transaction would be a losing proposition for both parties.

As the pullets approach maturity they are transferred to the large laying houses, each of which accommodates 600 birds. After a few days of confinement they are again given full liberty and permitted to wander at will unconfined by fences of any kind.

The laying and breeding houses are of the curtain front type, light, sunny, well ventilated. The openings in the front are large in size and are closed with the cloth-covered frames only during storms and extreme weather. Everything about the houses is kept sweet, clean and sanitary. Disease is practically unknown.

Bear in mind this important fact: Ingleside Leghorns inherit the abounding health and vitality which are the foundation upon which the practical poultryman must build if he wishes to make a success of his business.

# Our Leghorns


**W**E are convinced that as a breed the S. C. White Leghorn is the most profitable producer of market eggs. We believe that the Ingleside strain of Leghorns is the best utility strain in existence.

Years of patient work and a great deal of money have been expended in bringing our flock to its present degree of perfection. We have visited most of the leading Leghorn farms in the East; have purchased stock wherever we found birds that we thought would benefit our flock; have combined these blood lines; have selected as breeders only such specimens as made exceptional records. At all times we have considered vigor as being of primary importance. As a result we have perfected a strain that well repays us for the time and energy devoted to it. Health and productiveness are the dominant characteristics of our birds.

We have often been asked why we devote our attention solely to S. C. White Leghorns. The best answer we can give is that we are running a poultry farm for profit, and that the Leghorns bring in the money. They are the easiest to hatch and the easiest to grow. They mature in the shortest period of time. They do well when kept in large flocks. They lay the year 'round. They lose no time through broodiness. They produce eggs at the lowest food cost per dozen. Their eggs are large and white, and bring the highest prices in the great New York market. In short, they are the money makers. That's why we like and keep them.

Ingleside Leghorns are not bred for the show room. Their business in life is to lay big, white eggs and lots of them. And they do it! If you are searching for stock that will produce plenty of eggs for home use or market, you need look no further. We can furnish you exactly what you need. You can't get better business birds anywhere, no matter how much you pay.



**I**NGLESIDE Leghorns are good layers. They are bred for it. They are fed for it. They are housed and managed with a view to securing the most eggs and, therefore, the most dollars, from them. Won't this inbred tendency to shell out the egg month after month improve your flock? Introduce Ingleside blood and see how well White Leghorns can lay.

We depend upon our pullets to produce the bulk of our winter market eggs. The strongest individuals, the best producers, are retained for breeders during the second year. We also hatch a number of pullets early in the spring and get them to laying during August, September and October.

These early pullets go into moult in the late fall and winter and stop laying. The best of them are used for breeding purposes the following spring, since they are practically yearlings at that time, having moulted and rested during the winter months.

The ration used at Ingleside is comparatively inexpensive, but it gets results. We feed liberally. Hens must have plenty of raw material from which to manufacture eggs. Light feeding never brings a big flow of eggs.

The dry mash system of feeding suits us best. It is safe. It is easy. It reduces mortality and keeps the birds in the best of condition. This mash is kept before the stock at all times.

Ingleside Mash for Layers. (No. 1.)

200 lbs. Wheat bran; 100 Wheat middlings; 100 Corn meal; 100 Alfalfa meal; 100 Beef scrap.

The scratch grain is fed daily, morning and afternoon at the rate of 10 quarts per day per hundred hens.

Ingleside Scratch Grain Mixture.

Equal parts by measure Corn, Wheat, Oats.

Green feed is supplied in liberal quantities. Of course fresh, green grass and clover are found on the range during the warm months. At other seasons we depend upon cabbage and mangolds.

Grit, shell and charcoal are given regularly.

Every flock has plenty of pure, clean water. The great springs on our farms supply this in abundance.

Ingleside Leghorns lay. The careful breeding behind them is a big factor. Robust health, sanitary housing, liberal feeding of a suitable ration do the rest.

Ingleside layers will bring results for you, too.

# Profit Payers

**I**NGLESIDE Leghorns are profitable year after year. Our great breeding flocks are our especial pride. The males are the pick of thousands of cockerels which we hatch each year. They are big and rangy, pure white in color, and possessing the characteristics which careful Leghorn breeders so much desire.

The females are all fully matured. We never use pullets, excepting those which have laid for some months and then moulted and rested. The greater proportion of our females are yearlings or two year olds. From them we get the largest eggs, the highest fertility, the big, husky chicks.

These breeding females are wonderfully alike in type. Large in size, deep bodied, alert and active. We do not believe that any other breeder in the world can show so many typical specimens of the business type of S. C. White Leghorns.

We mate up our pens early, using plenty of males to insure good fertility. The feeding is done in such a manner as to discourage egg production until the natural breeding season arrives. We neither use nor sell for hatching purposes eggs from birds that are exhausted from laying throughout the winter months.

For scratch grain we use the mixture previously mentioned. The mash mixture is as follows:

Ingleside Mash for Breeders. (No. 2).

200 lbs. Wheat bran; 100 Middlings; 100 Corn meal; 100 Alfalfa meal; 100 Beef scrap or fish scrap; 50 Gluten meal; 50 Oil meal (old process); 50 Ground oats; 5 Table salt.


When eggs begin to come in liberal quantities, the amount of gluten, oil meal and ground oats is doubled.

Of course such necessities as pure water, grit, shell, charcoal and green food are provided regularly.

We give the breeders their freedom at all times. They are out of doors practically every day in the year. This produces strength, vigor, hardiness, and in turn insures eggs which hatch like pop-corn. The resulting chicks are big-boned and husky.

The eggs from the breeders are gathered at frequent intervals. The few imperfect eggs are culled out. We use none but perfect eggs of good size. And we send our customers only such eggs as we would be willing to place in our own incubators.



# Our Ducks

**I**NGLESIDE Pekin Ducks represent fifteen years of continuous work on the part of one of the best commercial duck men in America. These ducks are large in size, pure white in color, and have the deep keels that carry so much of the desired breast meat. Their rich orange-colored legs and bills, their white skin, and large proportion of flesh they carry, place them in a class by themselves. They have no equals among market ducks.

On most duck farms the crop of ducklings is produced only during the spring and summer months. At the Stouffer farm we grow ducks throughout the year.

This is made possible by the very favorable conditions existing on this farm. The many springs rising in the place unite in two streams which vary but little in temperature regardless of the season. Hence we are able to get fertile eggs at any season.

The visitor to this farm will find thousands of ducks of various ages at all times. The breeding flock usually numbers about 1,500 birds.

The breeding houses though simple, are large in size, dry and well ventilated.

Each flock of breeding ducks has a pen in the house, a land run and a swimming pool. The feeding is done from a car which runs on a track elevated above the yard fences. We have our own feed mill where the various grains required are ground and mixed.

Pekin Duck eggs hatch in four weeks. The ducklings are transferred from the incubators to a pipe-heat brooder house and later to growing houses. They are carefully fed, given plenty of fresh water and kept scrupulously clean. Under these conditions they make rapid growth and lay on great quantities of the fat, tender flesh which is so highly regarded by epicures.

The individuals which make the most satisfactory growth are removed and developed into breeders. Three lots of breeders are selected each year. Great care is exercised in selecting these future breeders, which is the secret of the uniform excellence of the flock.

All market ducklings are dressed at the age of ten to eleven weeks. At this time they are free from pin feathers, fat and juicy, and weigh from  $4\frac{3}{4}$  to  $5\frac{1}{2}$  pounds each.

When looking for Pekin Ducks, either mature stock, youngsters, or hatching eggs, it will pay you to come to our headquarters. Our duck farm pays us well because we have the right kind of stock. Does this quality interest you?

# Rearing

**S**UCCESS in poultry farming is largely measured by one's ability to rear a large percentage of the annual crop of chickens. At Ingleside we raise chickens. Good ones and lots of them. We attribute our success largely to the fact, that our breeding stock is **right**. It is bred right, fed right, managed right. And so we get chicks that are strong—able to stand "grief"—that grow if given half a chance. We give them them the best care, and how they grow!

Incubators devoted to the hatching of chicks have a total capacity of approximately 50,000 eggs. These turn out the thousands of Ingleside Leghorn chicks we need for our own use. Also the vast number which we ship as baby chicks to all sections of the country.

After hatching, the chicks are hardened off in the incubators, then transferred to the brooder houses. Our two chick brooder houses have a capacity of 11,000 chicks at one time.

At first the hover temperature is maintained at approximately 100 degrees. For the first few days the babies are confined in the hover compartment. Next they are given the run of the pen. At three weeks of age they have the run of the brooder house yards.

When they reach the age of six to eight weeks, according to season, they are moved to colony houses and given free range. From this time on they having nothing to do but eat and grow.


No food is given the baby chicks until they are at least forty-eight hours old. Chick grit and water are first supplied. Next comes a clean commercial chick feed, which is given five times per day. Sometimes the mid-forenoon and mid-afternoon meals are a moist mash made of the following:

Ingleside Mash for Little Chicks.

200 lbs. Bran; 100 Corn meal; 100 Middlings; 100 Alfalfa meal; 100 Beef scrap.

At three weeks the chicks receive meals but four times per day. At five weeks they are feed but three times daily. On the range they get grain twice a day and dry mash whenever they want it. Fresh water, grit, shell, charcoal, green feed are never omitted.




Inside view of Laying House



Partial view Mr. Woods' Home




Partial view Woods Lane Farm -

For baby ducklings we charge \$35 per 100, or \$25 per 100 in lots of 500 or more. Our system of packing permits us to ship ducklings safely for long distances.


All duck eggs for hatching are shipped when perfectly fresh. We never have to hold eggs until enough for a shipment can be collected. Duck eggs hatch best if absolutely fresh when set.

Prices for Pekin Duck eggs are as follows:— January, \$70 per 1,000; February, \$65 per 1,000; March, \$60 per 1,000; April, \$50 per 1,000.

All eggs are packed with greatest care and will reach the purchaser in perfect condition.

The market eggs from Ingleside Leghorns are all shipped to New York City to supply an exacting and exclusive trade. These eggs are all sterile, no males being kept with the flock. They are packed in cartons, each holding one dozen eggs, and sealed before shipment. We stand squarely behind our shipments of market products as we do behind the eggs, chicks or stock sent to our customers. We want the word "Ingleside" to be synonymous with quality—dependability—liberal treatment—the square deal.




## ENGLISH WHITE LEGHORNS

They have laid particularly well, and the eggs have been uniformly large in size.


From these birds we raised a nice lot of youngsters and this season will breed from the original stock and the early hatched pullets.




Partial view of the Breeding Yards



Breeding Ducks




Incubator Cellar and Store house


